## ADM Board Crisis Center for Adults

### Alcohol and Other Drug Emergencies

The ADM Crisis Center, operated by Oriana House Inc. serves as a central system for those with a variety of alcohol and other drug emergencies. They offer a drop-in 23-hour observation program, detoxification and centralized assessment services. The ADM Crisis Center services are intended to provide access and support to adult Summit County residents seeking services for alcohol and other drug problems. Services are provided by a staff of nurses, counselors, counseling interns, and paraprofessionals. In addition, a physician is on-call 24-hours-a-day, seven-days-a-week.

### Mental Health Emergencies

Psychiatric Emergency Services (PES) is operated by Portage Path Behavioral Health, Inc. and is the ADM System's primary provider of emergency and crisis stabilization services. The agency carries out its responsibility through a 7-day-a-week, 24-hour-a-day Psychiatric Emergency Services Unit, which encompasses an array of services to those in crisis or seeking emergency psychiatric services including a 24-hour hotline, crisis intervention services, and a crisis stabilization unit.

## **Crisis Services for Children or Teens**

### **Children's Hospital Medical Center of Akron - Psychiatric Intake Response Center (PIRC)**

The Psychiatric Intake Response Center (PIRC) answers questions from family members or other adults associated with children or adolescents experiencing mental, emotional and behavioral health problems. In addition, PIRC staff conducts preliminary risk assessments for children and adolescents in crisis who are considered to be high risk. PIRC is available 24-hours-a-day, seven-days-a-week and can be reached at

### **Child Guidance & Family Solutions (CG&FS)**

CG&FS maintains a 24-hour hotline service for youth and their families. Services include a brief assessment and crisis stabilization assistance over the phone and linkage to appropriate services either at the agency or elsewhere for follow-up. Those youth who are not clients and need an immediate face-to-face assessment because of the urgency of their situation are referred to the PIRC (Psychiatric Intake Response Center) of Akron Children's Hospital. For those youth who are clients, CG&FS staff provides immediate crisis assessment and intervention services, including face-to-face when necessary. Those requiring hospitalization for crisis stabilization purposes are referred to Akron Children's Hospital or other facility of the parent / guardian's choice.

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## ADM Board Overview

The County of Summit ADM Board is responsible for planning, funding, monitoring and evaluating treatment and prevention services for people who experience alcoholism, drug addiction and / or mental illness.

The ADM Board contracts with community agencies to provide quality, affordable services for people at critical times in their lives. The ADM Board system of services provides opportunities for recovery and hope for a better life.



Alcoholism, drug addiction and mental illness are real medical conditions that can affect anyone. Effective treatments are available and people do recover. One in four families experiences either a mental health or substance abuse problem. Summit County residents have a rich array of services and supports available to them through the ADM Board system.

In Ohio, local Alcohol, Drug Addiction and Mental Health Services Boards are given the statutory responsibility for seeing that services and facilities are available locally to help people with mental illness or alcohol / drug addictions. The ADM Board of Directors is comprised of 18 community volunteers who provide leadership in policy formation and fund allocation. They, along with ADM Board staff, assess community needs, plan, and manage public resources in order to provide essential services.

Almost 49% of the ADM Board's system resources come from the property tax levy approved by Summit County voters. It is through those levy dollars that people without insurance can still be served. The remainder of the ADM funding comes from state, federal and private sources.

This directory includes services funded by the ADM Board through contracts with local agencies.

## Alcohol and Other Drug Treatment Services for Adults

## **Emergency Crisis Services, Detoxification & Drop-In 330-996-7730**

The ADM Crisis Center, operated by Oriana House Inc. serves as a central system for those with a variety of alcohol and other drug emergencies. They offer a drop-in 23-hour observation program, detoxification and centralized assessment services. The ADM Crisis Center services are intended to provide access and support to adult Summit County residents seeking services for alcohol and other drug problems. Services are provided by a staff of nurses, counselors, counseling interns, and paraprofessionals. In addition, a physician is on-call 24-hours-a-day, seven-days-a-week.

### **Services provided at the center fall into three categories:**

#### **23-Hour Observation Beds / Drop-In**

This program is designed to provide a safe haven for persons apprehended by local law enforcement agencies due to intoxication. This results in diverted incarcerations, and an opportunity to intervene in the addictive process and encourage the client to engage in services to facilitate their recovery.

#### **Detoxification Services**

Detoxification refers to services usually provided in a non-hospital setting with 24-hour medical monitoring. Services are of brief duration, usually 2-4 days, which include linkage to other chemical dependency services. The Detox program is intended to serve clients who are intoxicated and/or expected to experience withdrawal from a life-threatening substance. Services include nursing care, chemical dependency assessments, individual and group counseling, chemical dependency education, and referrals for continuing care. While it is NOT a medical emergency facility, their proximity to area hospitals allows ready access to physical care.

## **Central Assessment Services**

Central Assessment Services provide chemical dependency evaluations and referral services to adult Summit County residents who are self-referred or referred by courts or community agencies. **Central Assessment is the ADM system gatekeeper for access to adult alcohol and/or drug residential treatment programs.**

## **Alcohol and Other Drug (AOD) Services**

### **Intake and Assessment**

Referrals and entry into the adult AOD system come in a variety of ways. The criminal justice system, family, friends, counseling agencies and hospitals make referrals to the ADM System. Each agency that contracts with the ADM Board has its own intake process where the individual receives an evaluation, and recommendations for services.

### **Individual Counseling**

Counseling services are targeted to the specific needs and issues presented by individuals. Services are individualized to address specific treatment needs, such as women's issues, anger management, etc.

### **Group Counseling**

Group Counseling involves a series of structured sessions that work toward the attainment of mutually defined goals.

## **Case Management**

Case Management services are designed to provide advocacy, support, and community-based interventions and activities to assist and support individuals and groups in gaining access to needed medical, social, educational, and other services essential to meeting basic human needs. Case management services may include interactions with family members, significant others, and/or other individuals.

## **Outreach / Intervention**

Outreach / Intervention services are defined as a planned approach to reach a targeted high-risk population within their environment. The purpose of this approach is to prevent and/or address issues and problems as they relate to the misuse of alcohol and other drugs.

## **Intensive Outpatient Program**

Intensive Outpatient Program (IOP) services are indicated for individuals who require a more intensive, structured treatment to achieve an improved level of functioning. Program participants are required to attend at least 8 hours per week. The goal of treatment is sufficient recovery to permit the transition to an aftercare component.

## **Residential Treatment Services**

Residential Treatment Services are designed to provide a full array of treatment services in a supervised residential setting. Services offered include assessment, individual and group counseling, educational programming addressing social and daily living skills, recovery, and relapse prevention skills.

## **Drug Screening & Analysis**

Toxicology Screening is the testing of a specimen to detect the presence of alcohol and other drugs.

## **Methadone Administration Program**

This service is the administration or dispensing of methadone to clients who are in treatment for opiate or narcotic addictions.

### Emergency Crisis and Detoxification Services

Each youth service agency provides its own crisis intervention services.

#### Assessment

Referrals and entry into the Youth AOD system come from a variety of sources, including families, child protective services, the juvenile justice system, and through Children's Hospital Medical Center. Each provider agency has its own intake process where the individual receives an evaluation and recommendations for services.

#### Individual Counseling

Counseling services are targeted to the specific needs and issues presented by individuals. Services are individualized to address specific treatment needs, such as relationship issues, anger management, etc.

## **Group Counseling**

Group Counseling involves a series of structured sessions that work toward the attainment of mutually defined goals.

## **Case Management**

Case Management services are designed to provide advocacy, support, and community-based interventions and activities to assist and support individuals and groups in gaining access to needed medical, social, educational, and other services essential to meeting basic human needs. Case management services may include interactions with family members and/or other individuals important to the child or teen.

## **Intensive Outpatient Program (IOP)**

Intensive Outpatient Program (IOP) services are indicated for individuals who require a more intensive, structured treatment to achieve an improved level of functioning. Program participants are required to attend at least 8 hours per week. The goal of treatment is sufficient recovery to permit the transition to an aftercare component.

## **Drug Screening & Analysis**

Toxicology Screening is the testing of a specimen to detect the presence of alcohol and other drugs.

## **Residential Treatment**

Residential Treatment services are provided on an individualized basis. The ADM Board screens referrals for adolescent residential treatment to identify appropriate providers based on the adolescent's needs.

## **Emergency & Crisis Stabilization Services**

Portage Path Behavioral Health is the ADM System's primary provider of emergency and crisis stabilization services. The agency carries out its responsibility through a 7-day-a-week, 24-hour-a-day Psychiatric Emergency Services Unit (PES), which encompasses an array of services to those in crisis or seeking emergency psychiatric services.

### **Hotline Service / Information Referral 330-434-9144**

SUPPORT is a mental health telephone crisis service staffed by both mental health professionals and trained volunteers. Services are available 24-hours-a-day for individuals with mental health emergencies or callers seeking information.

## **Crisis Intervention Services**

This service provides pre-hospital screening through a program known as Psychiatric Emergency Services (PES). PES provides emergency evaluations 24-hours-a-day, 7-days-a-week. Individuals arriving at PES are seen by a clinician, then by a psychiatrist, who work together to gather information, provide therapy, and prescribe medication when necessary. Patients are then referred to the proper inpatient, outpatient, or specialized service provider. Although PES is NOT a medical emergency facility, their proximity to area hospitals allows ready access to physical care.

## **Crisis Stabilization**

The Crisis Stabilization Unit (CSU) is a sixteen (16) bed unit which provides a structured, short-term residential environment where individuals are monitored and treated for up to 14 days. The goal of CSU is to manage the crisis in the most effective manner, then refer the individual for follow-up treatment services.

## **Intake and Referral 330-253-3100**

The Summit County ADM system has a single point of entry for intake, assessment, and referral services: the Summit County Adult Admissions Department. The Admissions Department is staffed by Portage Path Behavioral Health (PPBH) and Community Support Services (CSS). Individuals receive a diagnostic assessment and a referral for appropriate services.

## **Diagnostic Assessment**

A diagnostic assessment is a clinical evaluation provided by a qualified professional in order to assess client needs and functioning, determine appropriate service / treatment based on identification of the presenting problem, evaluation of mental status and formulation of a diagnostic impression. The outcome of the assessment is diagnosis and recommendations of appropriate services/treatment and/or the need for further assessment.

## **Individual Counseling**

Individual counseling and therapy services are provided by licensed clinicians. Treatment is of varied duration, using individualized treatment plans.

## **Group Counseling**

Group Counseling consists of a series of structured sessions that work toward the attainment of mutually defined goals.

## **Pharmacological Management**

Pharmacological Management services are provided by psychiatrists and advance practice nurses. These services include diagnosis and treatment, prescribing medication, on-going monitoring, and health screening.

## **Partial Hospitalization**

Partial hospitalization program is designed to provide intense treatment services to patients experiencing acute difficulties, who do not require 24-hour care.

## **Community Psychiatric Supportive Treatment**

Community Psychiatric Supportive Treatment (CPST) is intended to assist the client in overcoming barriers and reducing the symptoms of mental illness in order to restore the individual's functioning to the highest level possible. CPST supports the individual's ability to take responsibility for managing his/her mental illness and achieving and maintaining his/her rehabilitative and/or recovery goals.

## **Other Mental Health Services**

### **CHOICES Social Center**

CHOICES is a social center run *by* consumers of mental health services *for* consumers of mental health services. Choices exists to provide a social, recreational, informational and educational center for adults. The goal of Choices is to reduce the stigma of mental illness, provide equipment and exposure to various recreational activities, and to provide a center in which to make a positive contribution to the community.

### **Residential Treatment Services**

Residential Treatment Services for the ADM system are managed by CSS, with the ADM Board providing gate-keeping. Residential treatment is provided in four (4) separate sites: Edgerton House, Kibler Hall, Maggie Carroll Smith House, and Tarry House. Staffed by clinical and paraprofessional staff, all of these programs provide training to emphasize development of social skills, independent living skills, and symptom management. Lengths of stay are individualized, based on the participant's needs and continued benefit.

## **Respite Program**

The Tarry House, Inc. Respite Program is a short-term transitional service providing living quarters and/or support to Summit County residents with mental illness currently living in the community and at risk of becoming homeless. This service also provides family respite, freeing family members or significant others from care-giving responsibilities for limited time periods to attend to other family or personal matters.

## **Inpatient services**

There are a number of ways in which ADM system clients have access to hospitalization. Most individuals are first considered for lesser restrictive options, such as the Crisis Stabilization Unit to resolve crises. If these options are not appropriate, the individual may be admitted to either Akron General Medical Center, Summa Health System or to the Northcoast Behavioral Healthcare System (NBHS).

## Prevention, Consultation and Education (PC&E) Services

Prevention, Consultation and Education (PC&E) services are available from many of the ADM Board provider agencies and focus on building awareness, reducing risk and reinforcing protective factors. Educational programs are intended to affect knowledge, attitude, and/or behavior and are most often delivered in group settings. Staff from the ADM system provides PC&E services for individuals and organizations related to issues throughout the life span, from early childhood through the senior years. Schools, day care centers, nursing homes, public service staff and community service organizations are typical recipients of PC&E activities. Speakers are available on a variety of topics such as: suicide prevention gatekeepers training, developing positive parenting skills, understanding addiction / mental illness, the ADM Board system of care and much more.
